

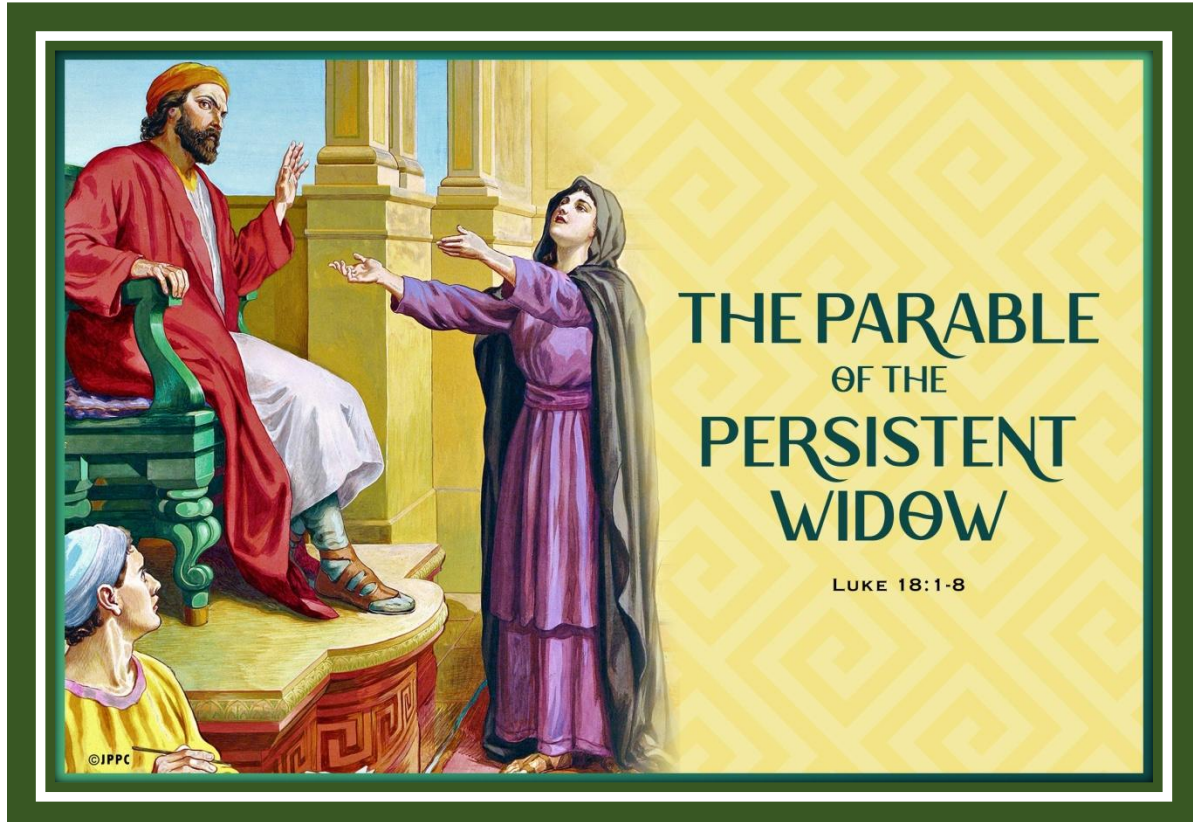

St. Luke was born in Syria and trained as a physician. He was also one of the most extensive writers of the New Testament. In addition to his gospels, he also wrote the 'Acts of the Apostles.'

He was one of 'the seventy' and worked with St. Paul, traveling to Rome and converting Jews and pagans to Christianity. He was also with Paul during several of his confinements.

Luke is also credited with being a prolific painter, creating many works of Mary and Jesus.

St. Luke is known as the patron saint of artists, physicians and surgeons.

He died at age 84 in Boeotia.

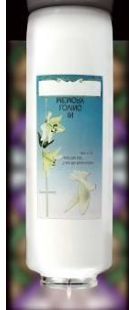
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Mass of the Dead, November 3, 2022, 7pm

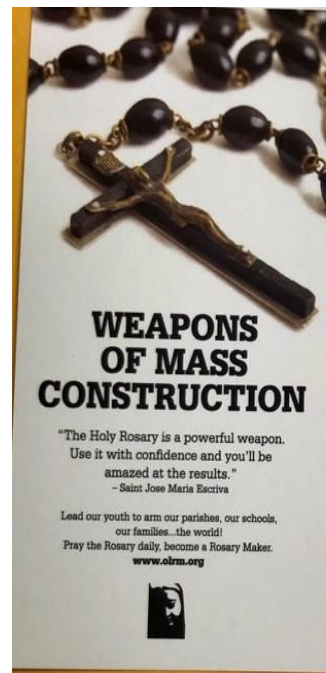



Dear St. Mary's Family,

One of the elements of Mass that can be easily overlooked is the offertory procession. Like so much of our Catholic liturgical tradition, the origin of the offertory procession and the gifts of bread and wine are found in Judaism.

Bread was offered as a symbol of one's life because bread was a staple of many other foods. To offer bread truly was a sacrificial act in the time of Jesus because of how important this was in the preparation of meals.

Wine, likewise, was used in Jewish liturgical actions, (sometimes referred to as a libation or drink offering). At the Passover, both bread and wine have a central importance. There were four cups of wine and it is the third cup, the cup of blessing, that Jesus prays over making his blood present sacramentally and really.

So, the offering of bread and wine, central to life and worship, is symbolic of giving one's entire life. This is what is represented in the offertory procession. It is as if we are offering our lives to God at every Mass.

This is further highlighted by the preface dialogue which precedes the singing of the *Sanctus*. "The Lord be with you... and with your spirit" invokes the Lord for the priest and the people, asking for divine assistance at this most sacred action. "Lift up your hearts... we lift them up to the Lord." Lifting something up is a priestly action, which is why the priest raises his hands at times during the Mass to pray.

At this point, the people, sharing in the priesthood of all believers through baptism, are performing a priestly act. They are lifting up their hearts to the Lord, making an offering of their heart, symbolic of one's whole life to God. It is truly right and just that we do this. When the priest prays that my sacrifice and yours be acceptable to God the Almighty Father, he is referring to his sacrifice, which, because he is acting *in persona Christi*, is the sacrifice of Christ, made present in an un-bloody manner on the altar, and the people's sacrifice which is the sacrifice of their life and heart to God.

So, we see that the offertory is much more than just a bringing forth of bread and wine. There is always a lot more that could be said. May this short explanation help us to understand a little more deeply the beauty of what we do at Mass.
